Our studio is a hub for workshops, classes, performances & community events we invite guest teachers regularly to offer classes & workshops to our community.

Jayne Lee Born in Wales, Jayne trained as a dancer in London at The Place, and at The Juilliard School in NYC, she danced and choreographed for London Contemporary Dance Theatre for 10 years and toured internationally.
